

Milton Open Space and Recreation Plan Update Public Forum #1 September 18, 2023

What existing recreation facilities could benefit from improvements? How could they be improved?
What natural resource protection strategies being used by the Town could be strengthened?

- Access to the Blue Hills
- Access/parking at Pope's Pond
- Better knowledge and access to other open spaces (Pope's/Turner's Ponds)
- Improve access to Blue Hills/Houghton's Pond
- Access to Houghton's Pond, Eustis Estate, and Wakefield
- Bike lanes needs physical barriers (painted lines are not safe)
- More Town support (\$) for Brookwood Farm
- Conservation Commission needs money to maintain land under their authority
- Preserve more than wetlands

Priority #3:

- No one knows you need permission to take down private trees
- Tree maintenance/care
- Need strategic plan for shade tree initiative (beyond 360 Project)...tree cover is disappearing on public/private land
- Need turf ban (Board of Health)

Priority #1:

- More sports fields
- Need more playing fields
- Need strategic plan for all grass fields reconstruction to alleviate field shortage (not piecemeal/one by one)



Priority #2:

- Incentivize private owners to preserve land in perpetuity
- Estate development protections

What are new recreational opportunities that the Town should consider? What natural areas need protection but are not currently protected? What are some new strategies to protect the natural environment?

Priority #1

- Tree protection/expand tree canopy
- Expand trees in Milton
 - Strategic plan for tree cover (short/medium/long term...plan ahead for legacy tree end of life)
- Youth Center

Priority #3 (tie)

Dog Park

Priority #2

- Increase open space and recreation
- Protect estate open space



- Need for parking signs at conservation land at bridge (Gile Rd.) behind high school (cars park on conservation land)

Priority #3 (tie)

- Playground in grassy area at Pope's Pond abutting Sumner (and benches)
- Ban plastic fields and invest in reconstruction of all grass fields (strategic plan)
- Improve accessibility to Blue Hills, Turner's Pond, and Houghton's Pond
- Regulations for fertilizer on grass lawns
- Enforcing pollution restrictions that affect clean water sources in Milton

Group #2 (Kellie/Craig)

Priority #3

- Take pride in all wetlands
 - Try to recover natural, native plants and species
 - Limit toxins
 - Use organic practices to help the environment

Priority #1

- Commit to preservation of open space lands
- Acquire open space for passive and recreation/sustainability
 - Approach owners of Great Estate properties about setting acreage in trust
- Connect Landing to Hutchinson Field along the water

Find new use for Brush Hill Road playground

GENERAL COMMENTS

- Who is DCS?
 - MA Department of Conservation Services.
- Is it a requirement to submit the draft OSRP to the state for approval? Does state have to approve plan?
 - If the Town want to be eligible to apply for funding through the state, then yes.
- What's the end date target?
 - Aiming for early (spring) of 2024
- Will Select Board have to review and approve the plan before it goes to DCS? Will the Planning Board?
 - Yes, the draft plan will be provided for all Town departments/boards/commissions for review and approval.
- In the 2006 OSRP, there was a 7-year action plan. Does this OSRP update include a report card on the 2006 OSRP action plan to evaluate how the Town did?
 - Yes, that will be included in the update. We can also post this to the project website.

- Related to CPC, private land... does the plan distinguish between land ownership? Is ownership included in the inventory? What about neighborhoods that have put restrictions on land?
 - Section 5 Inventory of lands of conservation/recreation interest we be updated to include all of these.
- The inventory is valuable. There's still a lot of confusion about who owns what and who is responsible for which resources. Is part of the plan identifying those responsible parties/owners?
 - o Yes, Section 5 will include this information.
